Plumbing Permits and Utility Leak Adjustments: In an effort to alleviate some of the burdens placed upon our citizens, the city is waiving permit fees for plumbing due to damage as a result of the storm. We have also made the process more streamlined by allowing emergency work to take place without an approved permit. Please ensure your plumber does apply for a permit and takes pictures and notes to include in city records with the permit. For water leak adjustments on utility bills, the city's policy is typically to provide one water leak adjustment per 12 month period. However, due to the storm, we are allowing leak adjustments to anyone regardless of whether you have already utilized this policy. Citizens will need to provide an invoice or other proof of work from the contractor.

Thank you for your patience as we move forward in trying to resolve the problems we have encountered during this time. I am so grateful for you and count you among my greatest blessings.
